Unexpended Funds (pink sheet)

ADA - no federal mandate exists with completion date. Long-term program – restrooms first and then playgrounds. Always looking for grant funding.

Greenview Knolls parking will go out to bid in the spring, completed by Sept 03.

Land Conservation

Donna Sasscer discussed the rural legacy in SMC. '04 CIP shows a decrease in funding of \$200,000. The Patuxent Tidewater Land Trust has worked up in the Huntersville area with grant funds. SMC's application for St. Mary's River Watershed was denied but will reapply. Funding may not be available anyway.

The county has participated in the Md. Ag. Land Preservation Program. 25 landowners applied for a total of \$10 million. FY03 on state level funds cut to \$666,000 and the county cut to \$333,000. '04 looks bleak so State may fund with bonds. There may be half or zero funding for MALPF as well. DPW may not be able to meet commitments to landowners.

The tobacco buy-out was going to be subject to appropriations and that the farmers did not trust State of MD. Farmers held out so bond funding was initiated But that's not even a sure thing. Those who signed up for the fourth of the five year buy-out program will not be funded and State will not offer a fifth year buy-out. The Ag Cmte took a vote that tobacco buy-out farmers will be paid first. If we do away with the infrastructure program, then it becomes difficult to help farmers transition into other products.

<u>Critical Farms</u> – A revolving loan fund which allows the County to put temporary easements on a farm that will eventually be placed under easement through MALPF or Rural Legacy. The program has not been used.

<u>Purchase of Development Rights</u> – Recordation tax rate was increased and for every \$4 of every \$500; \$.35 goes to PDR fund. Last year those funds went to Ag Pres Pgm. This can continue or not.

Unexpended balances (pink sheet) will require a decision on February 3, by the BOCC.

Facilities

<u>Unencumbered County Funds</u>: Government Center Addition/Renovation, Former Lexington Park Library, Lexington Park Family Center Demolition, Emergency Communications Facility Upgrades.

FY04 government center building needs adequate space for depts. already in the building. Provide a new mechanical system to handle high humidity and temperature problems and add a meeting room.

New Public Facilities: St. Andrew Maintenance Bldg., expand Leo'town Library, adult detention center, Governmental Center addition, Tudor Hall Conf Center, feasibility study on Carter Elem. How will it be used by county? CSM wellness & pool, Health Dept. renovation, A/P improvements, Fire Rescue revolving loan fund, Garvey Center upstairs expansion with elevator, Marcey House relocation within 10-12 yrs., ALS expansion, central storage and receiving area for Fac Mgmt., Charlotte Hall library renovation, tourist information/farmers market front of Charlotte Hill Library, north county storage, add a library in California, 2nd floor archives renovation, parking, roof, and ADA compliance are ongoing projects identified each year.

Commissioner Jarboe recommended all buildings over 50 years old be studied by Historic Preservation prior to demolition.
