Minutes of preceding regular meeting and Special meeting, April, 29,1943 read and approved.

Baldwin, Architect for the proposed new jail, read a letter he had received from the Director of the Richmond District of the F.W.A. acknowledging receipt of eleven photographs depicting the deplorable conditions of our present jail and expressing the opinion that the photographs would be of great help to him in making a decision on the County's application for Federal funds for a new jail.

The Board accepted the Bid of Mr.Alton S.Jump, Associate, E.Ernest Woollen, C.P.A., to Audit the accounts of the County Commissioners Office for \$200.0 County Treasurer Office for \$400.00, Sheriff's Office for \$125.00 and the Trial Magistrate's Office for \$125.00. It being understood the above audits would cover aperiod of one year and that if any saving in the estimated time required for them could be made the County would receive the benefit in a corresponding reduction of the above fees.

Being a special meeting the minutes were not read. Mr. Abell, heading a delegation of Trailer owners appeared before the Board and and entered protest against the County Commissioner putting into effect the provisions of Chapter 973 of the Acts of the General Assembly of Maryland, 1943 Session, commonly known as the "Trailer License Law" The delegation stated they were opposed to any form of tax or license fee on Trailers and would refuse to pay same, would ask the Court for an injunction against the enforcment of the law; they put forward the claim that the license should be charged against the land owner, in which case they would willingly pay him the charges. They also complained against the sanitary conditions in the camps and especially the Coppage camp at Great Mills. Mr. Chas. J. Mattingly, Sanitary Inspector, appeared before the Board and stated that due to the difficulty of camp operators in getting priorities for materials, and the urgency of of the work at Cedar Point the Health Department had been obliged to allow some latitude about facilities provided at the camps but had now notified the camp operaters they would have to comply with all sanitary regulations. He also stated that Mr. Coppage had supplied sanitary toilets and shower bath facilities at his camp and the trailer occupants had destroyed the toilets The Delegation was informed the Board had no discretion in the matter and the law would have to be enforced, but agreed not to start any prosecute for violations within tendays from this date Board adjourned at 10.45 P.M.
