Roads

Matters concerning roads brought to attention at this time were Mrs. Julia Maddox Stahl, Maddox, water drains on land and has ruined top soil-tenants threatened to move. After lengthy discussion on part of Mrs. Stahl, Board advised her this is a matter for the State Road and they contacted Mr. Thompson who agreed that it is not a County matter.

Mr. Sol Russell, concerning farm of his son Dr. Russell, was advised they will consult Mr. Thompson on drainage for this property.

Cornfield Harbor Rd- $\frac{1}{2}$ mi, Dunbar, Gruber and Brinkley must give R of W for this. Road is in good condition, needs gravel) ^{RM} ₅ _{GA}

Fresh Pond Neck- Spencer Wilkinson requested road be blacktopped- Mr. Thompson advised road is in fair shape, was built in 46-47.

Mr. Jere Gibson called with reference to request he made at recent meeting and he was advised that road only serves one family and therefore cannot be taken over.

Knott- road, 1st hill near St. Mary's City, at St. Inigoes leading to former Harris Tea Room, road washes out at entrance and needs black top.

Jimmy Carroll- road on Bay- Mr. Thompson will go over the road with Mr. Stone; see about R of W. Will take the matter up at the next meeting.

#4 Pub. School at St. Inigoes, owned by Bd. of Education and will be sold at public auction. Mr. Stone will so advise party who wants to by same.

Louis C. Abell-St. Inigoes wants ditch cleaned as now filled with dirt and causes water overflow on his farm.

Albert Russell and John Gibson- 7th District-want entrance pipe

Chas. Latham, needs small pipe to drain yard and advised road will be repaired soon and matter attended to.

Mr. Thompson has been advised of all road complaints and was present at most of the session.

Tall Timbers Erosion Project

Wm.L.Bowman, Surveyor, Comdr. James Downes, Mr. Nicolet consulted with Board as to plans prepared and presented by Mr. Bowman at this meeting. Needs 50ft of back fill. County agreed to fill to level of bulkhead and property owners take over from there. If one contractor to do all the work is secured it would be cheaper. Mr. Nicolet will work out ratio of all property owners' shares and property owners will then be notified. On receipt of their signed petitions etc., matter will receive final attention. Comdr. Downes says unless something is done and wall completed before fall storms, shoreline property owners will stand heavy losses.

Library

Miss Pickrell, librarian, advised the Bd. audit is being made and they will receive copy when completed.

Game Warden Gasden was informed he is allowed to destroy dogs interfering with game. He must have a letter from the Board to Geo. P. Shields, Chief Game Garden, 514 Munsey Bldg., Balto-2-Md. he will then be allowed to issue licenses and destroy dogs interfering with cattle and poultry. Letter sent.

Mr. Frank Bailey came in to determine time his pay should begin. Mr. Guy figured he should be paid \$311.11 from April to Dec 1951 which would give him his 1951 salary of \$2800.00 and then he will be paid up to and including Dec. 1954, his full 4 years. He was only paid \$233.33 in April and when his salary check is prepared in May it will be for \$311.11 for May

Mr. Bailey thanked the Board for tarring road at Stone's Wharf He also requested that a pipe be placed on the road near his old home. Lumber was piled by the side of the road and the ditch is filled and drain stopped up- this makes it dangerous as water cannot run in the ditch and drains off on the road

Closed Session.

In a closed session Det. Srgt. Murray Jackson and Mrs. Marjorie Doughty, clerk in that office appeared as requested by the Bd. The sheriff had complained that the clerk failed to cooperate with him in office assistance and that it was impossible to use the room for conferences with the Stats. Atty etc. Srgt. Jackson explained that the desk which is locked, as well as the file cabinet which is also locked, were purchased by the former C.Com. especially for him. All other furniture in the room is for anyone to use. He is very willing to cooperate with the sheriff at all times and has always done so. Mrs. Doughty said that she has offered to do any clerical work for the sheriff and he had asked her to write a report when she had a long report in her typewriter she had to complete at a certain time for the State Troopers. She explained this to the sheriff. Later he retd. and requested her to write a letter on his stationery and was 2 weeks bringing the stationery. Since then Mrs. Doughty has suggested making his reports etc., but he has only given her 2 to copy. One mileage report was incorrect, in that the same trips to

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the same place were of different mileage. When Mrs. Doughty questioned him, he told her to copy what he gave her. This she did. Srgt. Jackson says his locked file is work of 10 yrs and from it he can furnish information to the FBI or Civil Service Commission etc., and he does not feel it concerns anyone else and is not open for inspection.

States Atty. Jos. A. Mattingly came in and said that as far as he was concerned Mrs. D. cooperated with him whenever he had her to do any work; that his own secretary does his letters, etc., since she has time. He also said that if he needed privacy in order to talk over a case he would- and has- used the Petit Jury room or law library. He is very cooperative with everyone.

Clerk was instructed to write a letter to the States Atty; sheriff; Md. State Troopers who use the room and Mrs. Doughty to the effect that the room and furniture- with the exception of the metal desk and file cabinet- were for the use of all assigned to the room and the clerk was to assist them with their clerical-typewriting etc. Copy of the letter is on file.

Board of Education, with Miss Dent, appeared in the afternoon to ask for an allotment of \$37,500.00 to cover increase in pay of teachers. Gov. failed to sign the Bill which would have placed this burden on the State; said he feels it is a local affair. The County Budget for 1951 is already made and there is not sufficient appropriation to take care of this extra amount which would raise the taxes about 20¢ on the \$100.00 Mr. Alvey said he feels the County is paying a lot for education since 70¢ of all tax money goes towards that. He feels the cut should come, not in the teachers' salaries but somewhere else in the school program. He mentioned cafeterias and Miss Dent said the one at Hollywood School is being run without expense to the school, as it pays for itself. She also said that with salaries as at present a High School graduate can start at Cedar Pt for more money than a teacher. St. Mary's starts teachers at \$2,200.00 per yr. Calvert County starts at 2300.00. Miss Dent further said she has a good staff and is receiving resignations and the teachers are going to other counties where the salaries are higher. She had a chart showing salaries paid (and expenses for living in St. Mary's) and they do not meet the expenses.

Bd. of Education has already requested State aid for a school to be built in the Piney Pt section.

It was pointed out by Mr. Pierre Ghent that a school site has been dedicated since 1945 in the Pat. Park area. No one knew anything about this. A discussion is to be held concerning this later, on a special date. Mr. Ghent said the County must build a school on this site within a certain and money can be made available for this. Matter to be taken up later.

Mr. Thompson was requested to put in roads at the entrance to new schools and he explained this could not be done at State Roads expense, but the schools must pay for it.

Wherever new entrances are made, the expense is to be the cost to the property owner. If they secure the pipe the SRC can install it. Mr. Tilp, architect for Banneker, and Hollywood schools must request permit to construct new entrances -if old pipe can be salvaged it can be moved to new entrance- and pipe can be replaced on old entrances- but entirely new entrances must have new pipe at expense of property owners.

Errors in Assessment of Arthur Briscoe property-Cedar Pt Motor Co Atty Oliver Guyther and Atty Ed. Digges of Chas. Co. came in connection with taxes to Cedar Pt Motor Co; in 1949 assessed value was \$654.78, in 1950 a value was 199.00 Discrepancy was an error made by the bookkeeper-Leo Middleton of Waldorf, in valuing personal property and fixtures at 24,864. when it should have been 22,864 If the State Tax Commission will make a correction to \$22,864.00 the County will agree to make a refund to Mr. Arthur Briscoe of \$320.00 and the State Tax of \$20.00 Atty Digges had contacted Mr. Ward of the State Tax Comm whd advised it was an inequitable assessment and the Circuit Court will approve the allowances as above noted. A letter in the State Tax Comm office substantiates the statement of Mr. Middleton. Atty Guyther and Atty Sterling are to see Mr. Geo.L.Lawrence and advise the Bd. of the decision in the matter

// New 432 House development in Patuxent Park area Messrs. Pierre Ghent, architect, Richard B. Zantzinger of Wash J.T.Waring of Intn, appeared with plans for a new housing development in the Patuxent Park area. Mr. Nicolet said the Master Plan had been changed and the plans presented did not comply with requirements. Mr. Ghent said there had been no advertised change in the plans which was necessary and no public hearing had been held, and further that Mr. Nicolet had assisted him in planning the streets, etc., just recently and failed to advise him the Master Plan had been changed. Mr. Millison would not approve the plans and a meeting of the Planning Comm- Com. Stone- T.W.Bell, M.C.Thompson, H. Millison- was held. It appears the Preliminary plans had been approved by the former Planing Comm- and these plans are in accordance with the Master plans- after a lengthy discussion Mr. Bell moved the plans be accepted and approved and prepared- Mr. Stone seconded the motion and plans were accepted.

County Agent J.J.Johnson having requested a Mimeograph machine the Bd. approved same and instructed them to order it. It will cost \$372.55.

Resolution on Daylight Savings Time, making it effective Saturday midnight April 28, was passed by the Board and notices sent to the two County papers.
