Special Meeting

Friday, February 8th, found the County Commissioners of St. Mary's County, Md., in conference with members of the U.S., State and County Educational offices, to determine the status of Leonardtown as to eligibility for Federal Aid in the erection of a new Public School.

Dr. Wm. H. Coleman, U.S. Office of Education, Wash. D.C., Mr. James L. Reid, Supervisor of School Plants, State Department of Education, members of the County Board of Education, a representative of the Town Commissioners of Leonardtown, of the Leonardtown Chamber of Commerce and the P.T.A. attended the conference.

Dr. Coleman explained in detail Public Law 815, 81st Congress, Chap. 995, 2d Session, which is an Act relating to the construction of school facilities in areas affected by Federal activities.

Title 1

Deals with the Survey and State plans for school construction.

Sec 101 deals with assisting States to survey the need for construction of additional facilities in relation to the distribution of school population - and sums appropriated ~~in~~ pursuant to this section are to be used for States whose applications for funds to carry out such purpose have been approved

Sec 102-

- 1-designates the State Educational agency as the sole agency for carrying out such purpose
- 2-provides for making inventory and survey in accordance with Sec 101, containing information requested, for developing a State program in accordance with such section
- 3-provides that the State agency shall make such reports, in such form and containing such information as the Commissioner (U.S. Office of Education) may require from time to time, and to insure verification of such reports and give the Commission access to the records upon which such information is based.

Title 11

Sec 202-

Designates payments to local educational agencies
a-local agencies shall be eligible for payment where children reside on Federal projects with a parent employed on Federal property

b-children, reside on Federal property or who reside with a parent employed on Federal property

Federal Property

Federal property is real property which is owned or leased by the United States and is not subject to taxation by any State, or any political subdivision of a State, or by the District of Columbia.

County Seat not Eligible

After a lengthy and informative talk by Dr. Coleman, questions were asked as to the status of Leonardtown, which has been declared in the defense area. He explained that that classification did not make Leonardtown eligible for Federal aid in new school facilities. It was definitely established that Leonardtown is the County Seat, that its present public school building was erected and has been in constant use for more than 70 years- a 2 class-room frame structure, but that it is not eligible for Federal funds since the children attending school there do not come under either a or b- in Sec 202, since there must be at least 15 children of either classification, and must be 5% of the number of all children who will be in average daily attendance during the current fiscal year.

State School Loan only hope

The gist of the information received at the conference is that in order to erect a new public school in Leonardtown funds must be secured from other sources than Federal aid. It was explained that after all emergency buildings have been completed, in the various sections where defense activities have caused such emergencies, other school building programs may be considered to secure Federal aid. However, since that is a matter for future consideration and the present need at Leonardtown school is urgent, a new public school could be erected with funds secured through the State School Loan, the building could be completed and used for years until such emergencies have been cared for, and then application for part of the expense be made to be borne by Federal aid. This appears to be the only solution to the problem.

The meeting adjourned at noon.
